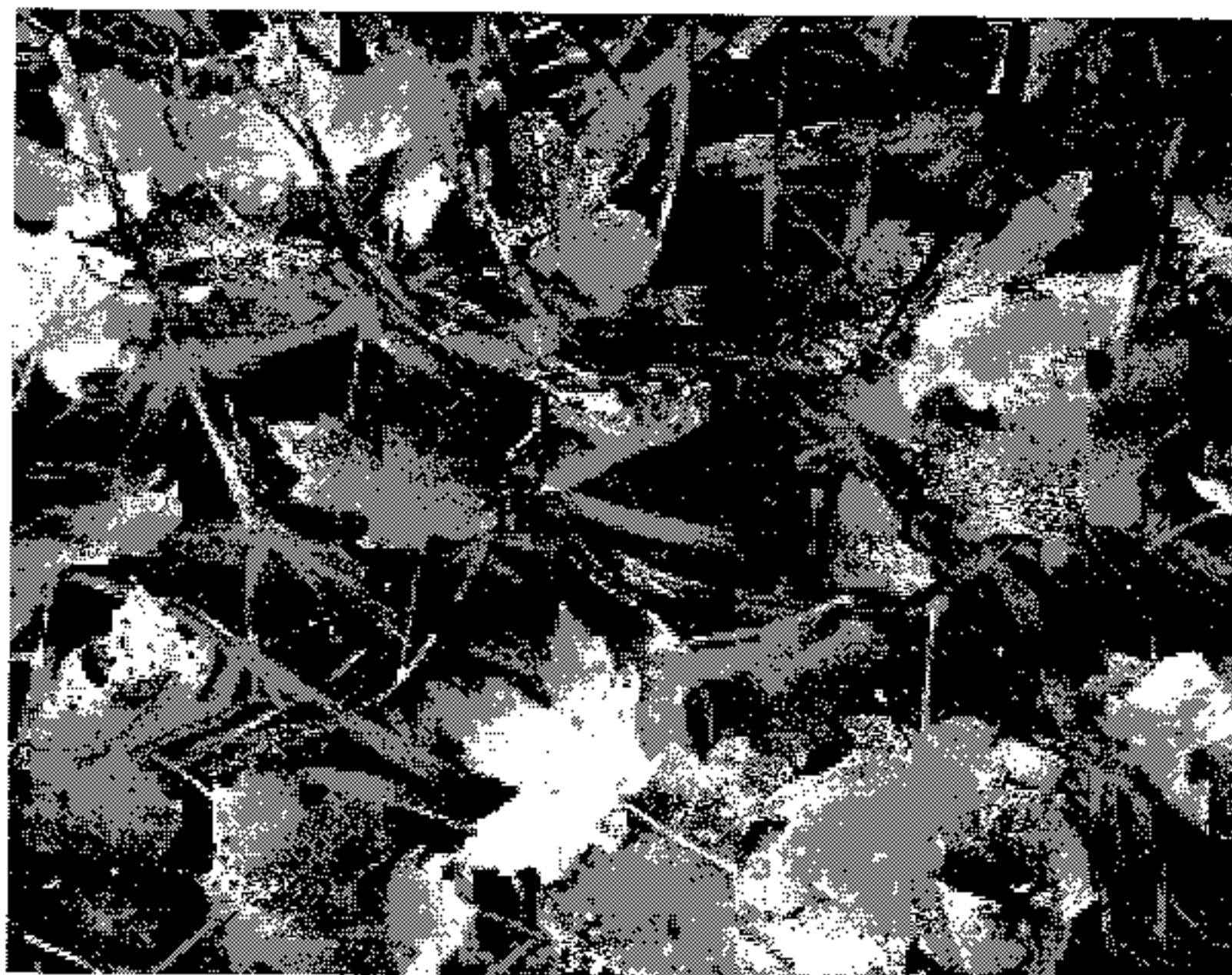

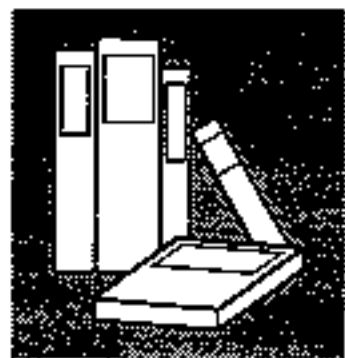

WHAT IS THE ACADEMY FOR LIFELONG LEARNING (ALL)?



ALL is a peer-led, membership-driven cooperative, which embraces learning as a lifelong process. 1. An OSU Tour with Notes on Campus History and Research
