We'll also honor YOU, the ALL members, for your faith in ALL and your participation in our first year of classes. Come and celebrate our success—and visit with your instructors and other ALL members. The program will be short, and light refreshments will be served.

Classes begin Wednesday, April 2, 2003 and end Thursday, June 5, 2003.

Classes are held at the OSU Foundation Boardroom, 35th and Western, Corvallis, unless otherwise noted.

1. The series "Issues and Ideas" continues on Wednesday mornings at the OSU Foundation Building.

Wednesday, April 2, 9:30–11:30 AM: Human Dimensions of the Salmon Debate

Pat Corcoran, Associate Professor of Political Sciences, OSU Extension Sea Grant Program, will lead an interactive discussion of the past and future roles for both salmon and people in the Pacific Northwest.

Wednesday, April 9, 9:30–11:30 AM: A Modern Deep Sea Creation Myth

Charles Miller, Emeritus Professor of Oceanic and Atmospheric Sciences, will share his ideas on the origin of life.

Wednesday, April 16, 9:30–11:30 AM: Thirty Years on the Bench

Robert Gardner, Senior Judge, will present an overview of the state and local judicial system.

Wednesday, April 23, 9:30–11:30 AM: Institutional Review Boards: Trying to Achieve Morality

Worldwide revulsion at past abuses in experimentation has resulted in the creation of committees charged with the responsibility to insure that the rights of human subjects are protected. Dr. Craig Leman will discuss the events which led to this rapidly evolving system, and the impact they have had on science and medicine.

Wednesday, April 30, 9:30–11:30 AM: Making Democracy Work Right Here in Corvallis

Helen Berg, Corvallis Mayor, will share her reflections on three terms as mayor. The mission of the government of Corvallis is "enhancing community livability". Its tools are public safety, parks and recreation, the library, water, sewers, streets, land-use and building regulations.

Wednesday, May 7, 9:30–11:30 AM: Physical Modeling of Waves

Charles Sollitt, Emeritus Professor of Civil, Construction, & Environmental Engineering, and former Director of the Hinsdale Wave Research Laboratory, will talk about the new Wave Lab facilities and research activities. He will demonstrate some of the apparatus. Parking is limited at the Wave Lab. Please arrive at the OSU Foundation by 9:10 in order to carpool to the Wave Lab. **Maximum 40 participants.**

Wednesday, May 14, 9:30–11:30 AM: US News Media: Their Political Role and Effects on "Conventional Wisdom"

Robert (Rob) Sahr, OSU Associate Professor of Political Science, will examine some of the choices journalists make and their effects on the "conventional wisdom," which is, what "everyone" knows to be true, whether or not it actually is factually correct. For example, journalists choose to cover some topics and not others or to present President Gerald Ford as "klutz" rather than as probably the most athletic president we have had in terms of actual achievement.

Wednesday, May 21, 9:30–11:30 AM: Oregon's Forest Futures: Where in the World are We Going?

Hal Salwasser, Dean of the College of Forestry and Director of the Oregon Forest Research Laboratory, will give an overview of global, national and state conditions and trends in forests and forest benefits. He will also discuss policy options for Oregon.

Wednesday, May 28, 9:30–11:30 AM: Plate Tectonics: A Key To the Ever Changing Crust of Our Earth

Allen Throop will discuss the development and basic concepts of the theory of plate tectonics, developed in the middle of the 20th century. He will address how it has revolutionized the geologist's view of how the earth's surface was formed, and how it affects our life in Corvallis.

Wednesday, June 4, 9:30–11:30 AM: Reflections on Changes in Funding for Education

Sam Stern, Dean of the OSU School of Education, will present an overview and reflections on changes in public funding for education.

2. **Africa, South of the Sahara Desert** – This series will focus on the countries south of the Sahara Desert in Africa, roughly south of a line drawn across Mauritania, Mali, Niger, Chad and Sudan. This includes about 35 countries. Since time constraints prevent a discussion of each country, we will look at three or four major regions of Africa. We will explore the cultures, peoples, history, foods, climate, land forms and some of the problems facing these countries. Speakers will include faculty who have first-hand experience and natives who are working or studying in the community.

Wednesday, April 2, 1:30–3:30 PM: Conflict in Africa

What are the roots of intra- and international conflicts in African countries? Dr. Larry Becker is an Assistant Professor in Geography at OSU and has studied and traveled in Mali, Nigeria, and Ivory Coast.

Wednesday, April 9, 1:30–3:30 PM: Conflict in Rwanda (1990-1994)

Emeritha Uwimana, a native of Rwanda, will discuss the factors used to call the Rwandan conflict a genocide rather than a civil war. She was not present during the massacres but her family was. Emeritha is employed at HP Corvallis.

Wednesday, April 16, 1:30–3:30 PM: HIV/AIDS in Africa

What is the current status of the HIV/AIDS epidemic in Africa? How is the epidemic being attacked? Why has Uganda made such rapid progress while other countries haven't? Dr. Donna Champeau is an OSU Associate Professor in the Department of Public Health. Marion McNamara is a Resource Development Coordinator in the OSU International Research and Development Office. They are conducting an HIV/AIDS capacity building program in Lesotho and Botswana.

Wednesday, April 23, 1:30–3:30 PM: Tropical Diseases in Africa

Dr. Philippe Rossignol, OSU Professor in Fisheries & Wildlife, will talk about tropical diseases which are prevalent in sub-Saharan Africa. How are they prevented? What precautions do travelers need to take? He has traveled and studied in India, Taiwan and Thailand, and published numerous studies on malaria, filariasis, Rift Valley fever and other parasites. His interests are in vector-parasite interactions, both at the physiological and ecological levels.

Wednesday, April 30, 1:30–3:30 PM: Pre- and Post-Colonial History of Africa

Dr. Laura Fair, Professor of African History at the University of Oregon, will give an overview of African involvement in the slave trade, European colonialism and its continuing legacy on the continent. Dr. Fair's current research is on commercial cinema in Tanzania, Kenya, and Uganda.

Wednesday, May 7, 1:30–3:30 PM: Western African Countries

Kweku and Diane Wilson, natives of Ghana, will present an overview of the geography, people, dress, food, climate, and culture of the countries in west Africa, including Senegal, Gambia, Guinea-Bissau, Sierra Leone, Guinea, Liberia, Cote d'Ivoire, Mali, Ghana, Burkina Faso, Benin, Togo, Niger, Nigeria, Cameroon, Central African Republic, Equatorial Guinea, Congo, and Gabon. Kweku is presently a Doctoral Candidate in Economics at OSU.

Tuesday, May 13, 6:00–8:30 PM: African Dinner

The dinner will include a unique and delicious combination of the foods of Africa including Bean Fritters, Algerian Minted Cucumbers, South African Soup, Angolan/Kenya Chicken Muamba, Couscous, Curried Corn, and fresh fruit. Many of our African presenters will join us for the evening in their native costumes. The dinner will take place on the OSU Campus, Memorial Union, Room 109 (at the west end). **Cost per person is \$30.**

Wednesday, May 14, 1:30–3:30 PM: Central and Eastern African Countries

Wilson and Daphne Mbugua, natives of central Kenya, will give an overview of the geography, people, dress, food, climate, and culture of the countries in east and central Africa, including Kenya, Uganda, Tanzania, Rwanda, Burundi, and the Democratic Republic of Congo. They are enrolled in MBA programs at OSU. They both plan to begin Doctoral programs at OSU in Economics Spring Term. **Note: This class will meet in the Alumni Center, Room 115.**

Wednesday, May 21, 1:30–3:30 PM: Southern African Countries

Dr. Ron Miner will give an overview of the geography, people, dress, food, climate, and culture of the countries in southern Africa, including Angola, Zambia, Malawi, Zimbabwe, Botswana, Mozambique, and Madagascar. Dr. Miner is a Professor in the Bioengineering Department, an Extension Specialist and member of the Honors College faculty. He and his wife lived on the Bunda College of Agriculture campus of the University of Malawi in 1998. He taught classes in agricultural engineering and mathematics and participated in the overall life of the institution.

Wednesday, May 28, 1:30–3:30 PM: Republic of South Africa

Lella S. Umedaly will present an overview of the geography, people, dress, food, climate, and culture of the countries of the Republic of South Africa, Lesotho, and Swaziland. She is a retired Montessori daycare owner, a Muslim of Indian decent, and born and raised in Pretoria, South Africa. The family left South Africa because of apartheid and migrated to Uganda. During the dictatorship of Idi Amin the family left Uganda and moved to Canada.

Wednesday, June 4, 1:30–3:30 PM: Art in Africa

Muneera Spence will present an overview of the various art forms in Africa and where they are located. She is an Assistant Professor of Art at OSU. After fleeing Uganda during the regime of Idi Amin, she received advanced degrees from West Virginia University and Yale University and has traveled extensively in Kenya, Uganda, Tanzania, Republic of Malagasy, Central Asia (Tajikistan, Kyrgystan), and England.

The Clubhouse is on your right as you approach the main entrance of the residence lodge. Enter by the doors to the large room. Thursday, April 3, 9:30–11:30 AM: Civil War: Why the War Came?

Friday, April 18 and 25, 9:30–11:30 AM: What's Happening in the 2003 Oregon Legislature

Join former State Senator Cliff Trow and State Representative Tony VanVliet when they review what's happening in the current legislative session.

Tuesday, April 22, 1:30–3:30 PM: The Stories Stone Tools Can Tell

Ann Rogers, Cultural Resources Manager for the OSU College of Forestry, will talk about the obsidian trade and trail system of the Native Americans in western Oregon. She will illustrate her talk with obsidian artifacts.

Friday, April 11, 1:30–3:30 PM: The Spring Night Sky

Steve McGettigan and members of the Heart of the Valley Astronomy Club are back to present a program on the evolving universe and the spring sky over Corvallis.

Tuesday, April 15, 1:30–3:30 PM: Micronutrient Research for Optimum Health

Dr. Balz Frei, Director of the Linus Pauling Institute located on the OSU campus, will discuss the Institute's mission and focus on micronutrient research and health.

Thursday, May 8, 1:30–3:30 PM: Horticulture Tour of OSU Campus

Pat Breen, OSU Professor of Horticulture, will lead a walking tour of the OSU campus, with special emphasis on the identification of shrubs and trees, especially those that flower in the springtime. Meet at the front entrance of the OSU Alumni Center. **Maximum 25 participants.**

Thursday, May 15, 1:30–3:30 PM: Tour of the National Clonal Germplasm Repository

Friday, May 16, 8:30 PM: Total Lunar Eclipse Star Party

Steve McGettigan and the Heart of the Valley Astronomy Club will hold a star party to view a total eclipse of the moon. As the sun sets the moon will rise in total eclipse. Totality ends at 9:06 PM. Partial eclipse ends at 10:17. There will be several telescopes through which to view the moon and other celestial objects. Exact location of the star party is pending. More information will be available on April 11.

Tuesday, May 20, 27, 30 and June 3, 1:30–4:30 PM: Understanding Our Forests

Dick Powell, a Corvallis and OSU native, has worked as a forester for Starker Forests for over 30 years. He will help us to understand how people value and use our forests and the forest life cycle. He will lead us on field trips to view forests, a logging site, a tree farm and give us a first hand exposure to timber crusing and tree age determination.

Tuesday, May 20, 1:30–4:30 PM: Forests, Yesterday and Today

Dick will explore how people value and use forests, the role of forests in US and world history, and the forest cycle.

Tuesday, May 27 or 30, 1:30–4:30 PM: Field Trip to Starker Forests

This will include a walking tour of Starker Forest sites and hands on experience with timber crusing and tree age determination tools. Transportation by Starker Forests' bus will leave from the OSU Foundation. **Maximum each day, 14 participants.**

Tuesday, June 3, 1:30–4:30 PM: Field Trip to Logging Site and Tree Farm

All classes are held at the OSU Foundation Building at 35th and Western unless otherwise noted.

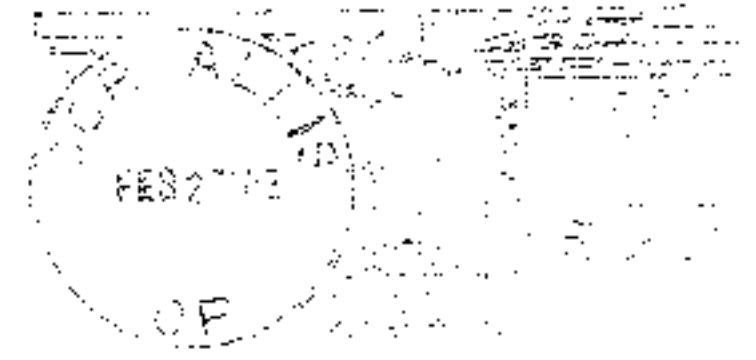
