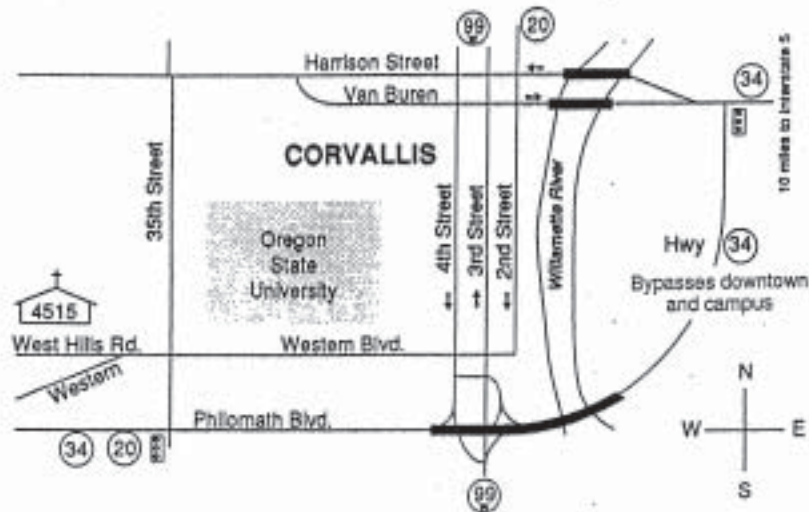

## FALL COURSES

**Classes are held at the First Congregational Church, on West Hills Road unless otherwise noted.**

### 1. Fine Arts

**Tuesday, September 14, 9:30–11:30PAM: Art History – An Overview from Lascaux to Impressionism**

Dan Cannon, Emeritus Professor of Art at Western Oregon University, will give a slide presentation and discussion of art over time. He will begin with prehistoric, early Mexican, move through Greek and Roman and on up to the 20<sup>th</sup> Century.

**Tuesday, September 21, 9:30–11:30AM: *Our Town* – No Town and Every Town**

When *Our Town* was first performed, it caused an explosion. Actors not only talked to each other, but they turned to speak directly to the audience. Since this play will be produced at OSU this year, Art Bervin, retired LBCC English instructor, will lead a shared reading and discussion of this Thornton Wilder classic.

**Cost is \$1 for supplies.**

**Tuesday, September 28, 9:30–11:30AM: OSU Campus Art Tour**

Doug Russell, OSU Art Department Senior Faculty Research Assistant, will begin the tour with a review of the Annual Faculty Show in Fairbanks Hall. Other venues may include the Engineering Building, Memorial Union Gallery, Library art, campus sculptures and the LaSells Stewart Center Gallery.

Tour will begin at Fairbanks Hall. A shuttle will be provided from the church parking lot for those needing transportation.

**Tuesday, October 5, 9:30–11:30AM: Utopias – Ways to Change the World**

Brooks Spencer, OSU Emeritus Professor of History of Science, will examine literary utopias, in which an author imagines a few basic social conditions to be significantly, but plausibly different than the social conditions which he strongly objects to in his own society.

**Thursday, October 7, 1:30–3:30 PM: The Piano Rags of Scott Joplin – a Study in Syncopation**

**Tuesday, October 12, 9:30–11:30AM: Corvallis Architecture in the 19<sup>th</sup> Century**

Mary Gallagher, Benton County Historical Museum Collections Manager, returns to present a slide-lecture program on the local, regional and national developments that shaped the community's building environment. The program will include many images of Corvallis from the museum's extensive photograph collections.

**Tuesday, October 19, 9:30–11:30AM: Dystopias – Ways to Warn the World**

Brooks Spencer returns with this follow-up class to Utopias. In a dystopia the author exaggerates the faulty social conditions of his society in order to warn of the ghastliness of the future.

**Tuesday, October 26, 9:30–11:30AM: Corvallis Architecture in the 20<sup>th</sup> Century**

Mary Gallagher returns with her extensive photographs to illustrate the local, regional and national developments that shaped Corvallis' building environment in the 20<sup>th</sup> Century.

**Classes are held at the First Congregational Church, on West Hills Road unless otherwise noted.**

**Wednesday, November 3, 1:30–3:30PM: Beethoven’s Eroica Symphony**

When it appeared two centuries ago, the Eroica Symphony burst the bonds of tradition and radically transformed the concept and composition of symphonies for the 19<sup>th</sup> century and beyond. David Eisesman, OSU Emeritus Professor of Musicology, will explore these unique and revolutionary aspects and acknowledge how Beethoven incorporated and transformed other works using the same musical criteria.

**Tuesday, November 3, 9:30–11:30AM: Towards Sustainability and Architecture**

Tom GennÈ, Architect for CHM Hill, will discuss how we can move toward more sustainable solutions in the buildings we design and why this is important. He will discuss global conditions that drive the importance of sustainability and the importance of integral design in developing more sustainable solutions. He will also look at examples of applying sustainable principles to buildings.

**Tuesday, November 16, 9:30–11:30AM: Six Mini Book Reviews**

Various ALL and community members will present brief reviews of books they recommend. There will be time for discussion and additional class recommendations.

## **2. History, Politics and Philosophy**

**Tuesday, September 14, 1:30–3:30PM: Toothpaste, Toilet Paper and Political Candidates: The Merchandising, Marketing, and Advertising of Getting Elected**

From debates and issues to warring sound bites, bumper-sticker slogans, and emotional visual imagery – TV has exploded from a novelty to necessity to a routine part of political campaigning. Denny Miles, former media political consultant, will dissect the process of getting elected in American politics.

**Tuesday, September 21, 1:30–3:30PM: Filling in the Circles: Mail-in Balloting and its Effects on Getting Elected in Oregon**

Oregon’s mail-in balloting has affected the campaign process, particularly the merchandising, marketing, and advertising of a candidate. Long-time media political consultant, Denny Miles, analyzes how getting elected Oregon when voting can occur before election day, must change if media is to play a major role in the voting process.

**Tuesday, September 28 and October 5, 1:30–3:30PM: From Golf Club Heads to Victorian Homes – Albany’s Unusual History**

Doug Killin, Past President of the Monteith Historical Society, and Jerry Brenneman, President of the Albany Regional Museum, will explore Albany’s unique history. October 5<sup>th</sup>, class members will tour the Monteith House, Oregon’s most authentically restored pioneer home, and the Albany Regional Museum. The September 28<sup>th</sup> class will be at the Congregational Church.

**Tuesday, October 12, 1:30–3:30PM: Hollywood, the Movies and Politics**

*The Candidate, All the President’s Men, Bullworth, Primary Colors, The Contender* – just some of the films dealing with the electoral process in America: getting elected, gaining power, and keeping it. This class will analyze the reflection of our political process as seen in Hollywood’s mirror.

**Tuesday, October 19, 1:30–3:30PM: On the Trail of Lewis and Clark**

The present Bi-centennial celebrations of Lewis and Clark’s epic expedition and exploration of 1804-1806 prompted Lois Meesen, member of the Lewis and Clark Trail Heritage Foundation, to recall her own personal “Voyage of Discovery”, camping along the Lewis and Clark Trail from Wood River, Illinois to Fr. Clatsop, Oregon.

**Tuesday, October 26, 1:30–3:30PM: The Lewis and Clark Expedition: Part I. The Jeffersonian Context**  
Cliff Trow, OSU Emeritus History Professor, will discuss the Expansionist impulse during the administration of Thomas Jefferson and the role played in it by the Lewis and Clark Expedition.

**Tuesday, November 2, 1:30–3:30PM: Other People’s Kids**

Michele Wilson, Anthropology instructor at LBCC, will focus on diverse strategies used by people around the world in raising their children. Though child-rearing is influenced by many things including environment, history, tradition, religion and globalization, many practices share more in common than we think.

**Tuesday, November 9, 1:30–3:30PM: The Lewis and Clark Expedition: Part II. Historical Legacy**

Professor Trow returns to explore the consequences over time of the Lewis and Clark Expedition for Oregon and the Nation.

**Tuesday, November 16, 1:30–3:30PM: That Was the Election that Was Sorting through the Electoral Fall Out**

Bill Lunch, OSU Professor of Political Science and OPB Political Analyst, examines the results of the 2004 election, focusing particularly on the results in Oregon and the Northwest.

### 3. India

**Wednesday, September 15, 9:30–11:30AM: Geography of India**

Charles Langford, Associate Professor Emeritus of Sociology, will discuss the continental drift, river patterns, agricultural land, mountain ranges, petroleum, minerals, railroad, cities, and their effect on cultural development. Dr. Langford has made a dozen trips to India since 1978 and has taught classes on India at OSU.

**Wednesday, September 22, 9:30–11:30AM: History and Pre-history to the Present**

Charles Langford returns to discuss the empires of Asoka and Akbar, British Colonial rule, independence since 1948, including the prime ministers, government alignments, and structure.

**Wednesday, September 29, 9:30–11:30AM: Classical Music and Dance**

Megha Shyam, moved to Corvallis in 1977 to join HP and recently founded Sparcom. Born and raised in India by a musical family, some of whom were award winning scholars of Indian musical traditions, Dr. Shyam will present India’s two primary musical traditions, evolving over the past 2,000 years, from the Hindu north (as influenced by Persia) and from the Muslim south. He will also discuss the several styles of dance, which often invoke the gods.

**Wednesday, October 6, 9:30–11:30AM: India: Unity in Diversity**

Shraddha Sorte, a graduate student in computer science, is from Pune in central India. Shraddha will explore India’s cultural diversity, which spans 25 states, 7 union territories, and 24 chief languages, each spoken by a million or more people, as well as numerous other languages and dialects. She will consider India’s various customs, its cultures, and traditions to demonstrate India as a truly kaleidoscope of cultures.

**Wednesday, October 13, 1:30–3:30PM: Cricket: Mass Consumption and Peace**

Sriram Natarajan, a graduate student in computer science, is from Chennai, formerly the historic southern city of Madras. †Sriram will examine India’s obsession with cricket, the game introduced by the British. He will also discuss the mindset of the fans of this product of mass consumption, its far-reaching scope and how it is being used to promote peace on the subcontinent.

**Wednesday, October 20, 9:30–11:30AM: My Journey to America**

Thimmappa Anekonda, assistant professor at OSU and OHSU, shares the story of his unplanned childhood journey from his remote village in India to America. “It simply happened! Striking differences among different castes, among different socio-economic classes, and between rural and urban environments impose life-lasting mental barriers to child development. The barriers to adult development in the US are not that different; here the barriers appear in different names and colors!”

**Wednesday, October 27, 9:30–11:30AM: Women’s Roles in Society**

Parvathy Binot, a junior in business with a minor in women’s studies, is from Kerala in South India. Parvathy will examine the dynamism, ambition, and energy of India’s educated women, the traditional roles that women played and still play in Indian society. She will also consider the social, economic and cultural affects of the liberalization and globalization on Indian women today.

**Tuesday, November 2, 9:30–11:30AM: Castes: Theory, History, and Practice**

Charles Langford, OSU Emeritus Associate Professor of Sociology, returns to discuss the structure of the caste system, including its relationship to family and economics

**Tuesday, November 9, 6:00PM: Indian Gala Dinner at the Evergreen Restaurant**

**Wednesday, November 10, 1:30–3:30PM: Dynamics of Indian Politics**

Kiran Polavark, a graduate student in computer science, is from Vijayawada, a vibrant city in the interior of a southern state, Andhra Pradesh. Kiran will enter the dynamics of Indian politics, while discussing what it means to be termed the “world’s largest democracy.” He will consider the importance of understanding India first before understanding the dimensions of its politics.

**Wednesday, November 17, 1:30–3:30 PM: India’s Movie Industry**

Harish Jaganna, a senior in economics, is from Andhra Pradesh, a South Indian state noted for its fast growth in information technology. Harish will show film clips as a fascinating journey into the Indian movie industry, one of the largest in the world. He will examine Indian movies and their influence on Indian culture and society, both in India and abroad.

#### 4. Science

**Thursday, September 16, 9:30–11:30 AM: Genetics and Common Adult-onset Diseases**

Kerry Silvey, Genetic Counselor and Genetic Services Specialist from the Child Development and Rehabilitation Center of OHSU, will talk about the inheritance of cancer, diabetes, and other common adult-onset diseases, genetic testing, and Oregon’s genetics privacy laws.

**Thursday, September 23, 9:30–11:30 AM: The Corvallis Water System and What You Can Do to Conserve**

Mark Taratoot, Corvallis Public Works Water Resources Specialist, will discuss the Corvallis Water System, including water sources, treatment, and distribution. He will also focus on the water conservation and pollution prevention programs and provide ways that citizens can save water and money.

**Thursday, September 30, 9:30–11:30 AM: Understanding Forest Certification and Ecolabeling**

Eric Hansen, OSU Associate Professor of Wood Science and Engineering, will discuss the historical development of Forest Certification and current marketplace developments. Forest Certification – and on-the-ground assessment of forest practices – is an important trend in the forest products industry.

**Thursday, October 7, 9:30–11:30 AM: The Atmosphere of Mars and Mars Exploration**

Jeffrey Barnes, OSU Professor with the College of Oceanic and Atmospheric Sciences, will discuss the atmosphere of Mars and the missions that studied it. Professor Barnes has been involved with several past Mars missions, and will be a participating scientist on the Mars Reconnaissance Orbiter Mission scheduled for launch in 2005. He will also briefly discuss some aspects of the recent Mars Exploration Rover Mission.

**Thursday, October 14, 9:30–11:30 AM: The Diagnosis and Treatment of Chronic and Recurring Lower Back Pain**

Two thirds of all chronic and recurring lower back pain sufferers have a condition known as “Pelvic Tilt Syndrome” as a major contributing cause of their lower back pain. Unfortunately, they don’t know that Pelvic Tilt is present, nor do many health professionals. Dr. Harry Oxenhandler will discuss the diagnosis, treatment and prevention of chronic and recurring lower back pain caused by “Pelvic Tilt Syndrome”.

**Thursday, October 21, 9:30–11:30AM: Living with Earthquakes in the Pacific Northwest**

Robert Yeats, OSU Emeritus Professor of Geosciences, will review the earthquake hazards faced in the Pacific Northwest and ways we can strengthen our homes and ourselves against the next large earthquake. He requests that all participants get his book *Living with Earthquakes in the Pacific Northwest*, Second Edition. It may be ordered from the OSU Press on-line or the OSU bookstore.

**Thursday, October 28, 9:30–11:30 AM: Staying Healthy during World Travel**

Wolfgang Dengler, M.D. will discuss important issues affecting senior travelers: protection against illness and injury including insect-related and water-borne diseases; vaccinations, access to health care and insurance questions when travelling; evaluating limitations due to pre-existing medical conditions and current internet resources.

**Thursday, November 4, 9:30–11:30 AM: Talking Toxicology**

Dr. Fred Berman, Director of the Toxicology Information Center at OHSU, will cover the background of toxicology and its importance in human health, including our exposure and medications involved.

**Thursday, November 11, 9:30–11:30 AM: Taking Care of Caretakers**

As we grow older, many of us become caretakers of parents or a spouse. Dr. Clara Pratt, OSU Professor of Gerontology, will review the research done in gerontology and also her personal experience with the problems of being a caretaker.

**Thursday, November 18, 9:30–11:30 AM: The Busy-ness of Bees**

Bees are busy around the world, and there are many varieties of bees. Mike Burgett, OSU Emeritus Professor of Entomology, is an expert on bees and does consulting work in many countries. Why are bees so important?

## 5. Issues and Ideas

**Thursday, September 16, 1:30–3:30 PM: Is Outsourcing Good for America?**

What does a globalized economy mean for American workers? Is the American Century/Dream over? Michael O’Malley, Ph.D. candidate and OSU instructor in the School of Education, will explore these questions.

**Thursday, September 23, 1:30–3:30 PM: Health Care Reform: What’s the Direction?**

Dr. Roberta Palmer, Anesthesiologist with the Veterans’ Administration, is a supporter of a national health plan and will share progress being made in the US and her experience with national groups.,

**Thursday, September 30, 1:30–3:30 PM: Genetic Engineering and Natural Resources – a Troubled Beginning and an Uncertain Future**

Genetic engineering is the standard for biomedical research and medicine development, yet has given rise to controversy and regulations. What are the causes? What information is scientifically credible? Steve Strauss, Director of the OSU Program for Outreach in Resource Bio-technology, will discuss some of these issues.

**Thursday, October 7, 1:30–3:30 PM: The Piano Rags of Scott Joplin – a Study in Syncopation**

John Maddy, pianist, composer and lecturer, will cover the nature of syncopation and its use in the works of Scott Joplin and his contemporaries. It will reveal what makes the rag “ragged”. John will perform several of Joplin’s rags at the piano.

**Thursday, October 14, 1:30–3:30 PM: Understanding Poverty in Corvallis**

Julie McCann, principal of Lincoln School in southeast Corvallis, will talk about the poverty obstacles her children and families face and identify some strategies she and her staff are employing in the school community to overcome them.

**Thursday, October 21, 1:30–3:30 PM: Fire in Oregon’s Forests**

Mike Cloughesy, Director of Forestry, Oregon Forest Resources Institute, will review the role of fire in Oregon’s forests. He will discuss why we are experiencing more large severe fires than we have in the past, how today’s fuel situation in our forests is different than the historic norm, and what measures foresters and landowners can take to reduce the likelihood of uncharacteristically severe fires in Oregon and the western states.

**Thursday, October 28, 1:30–3:30 PM: A Whale of a Time**

Bruce Mate, OSU Professor of Fisheries and Wildlife and Director of the Marine Mammal Program, will talk about his research using satellite technology to determine the movements and critical habits of endangered whales. Dr. mate and his wife Mary Lou lead an annual natural history adventure to San Ignacio Lagoon where Participants have a close encounter while visiting the world’s best gray whale calving area.

**Thursday, November 4, 1:30–3:30 PM: Mental Health Services for the Elderly**

Mitch Anderson, Manager of Mental Health Services, Benton County Health Department, will discuss the concerns and options for elderly mental health services in Benton County.

**Thursday, November 11, 1:30–3:30 PM: Saving the Horner Collection**

The Horner Collection and the work of the Benton County Historical Society to save and provide a new home for it will be explored.

**Thursday, November 18, 1:30–3:30 PM: The Management of McDonald Forest**

Hal Salwasser, Dean of the OSU College of Forestry, will discuss the future of Oregon Forests and update plans for the operation of McDonald Forest.
