July 11—*Steve Thomas*—**Palm Harbor Manufactured Homes Plant Tour** Palm Harbor Plant, Millersburg 🚗

See how modern manufactured homes are constructed. You'll be amazed at the construction techniques, automation, and quality control that go into making such a home. Note: the tour involves climbing 2 flights of stairs.

Meet at the Palm Harbor parking lot. Driving directions: Take Highway 20 to Albany. Go left on 2nd St., right at Main, then immediate left onto Salem Ave. Stay on Salem Ave, which becomes Old Salem Rd. Pass by paper mill. Left at T intersection (do not cross under I-5), continue on Old Salem Rd, then right on Palm Harbor Drive. Parking lot is about 3.1 miles from Waverly Lake.

July 18—*Tom Ten Pas*—**Tour of Albany Talking Waters Garden** Simpson Park, Albany 🚗

This project was designed to provide cooling and additional natural treatment for wastewater before it was discharged into the Willamette River. This \$13 million project is the first of its kind in the U. S. and received an Excellence in Environmental Engineering award from the American Academy of Environmental Engineers. It consists of 39 acres of created wetlands and 11 acres of landscaped area. It features waterfowl, mink, raptors, and numerous other bird species.

Meet at the parking lot at Simpson Park, 778 Waverly Drive NE, Albany. Driving directions: Take Highway 20 to Albany. Go left on 2nd St. Stay on 2nd to Geary. Left on Geary 3 blocks to Front St. Right on Front St. After about ½ mile, slight left onto Waverly Drive. Parking lot on left in about ½ mile.

July 23-24—**Columbia Gorge Tour** [See Separate Flyer]

A two-day field trip with overnight accommodations and transportation. Register and pay by June 6th. See ALL website for additional details and registration forms.

Aug. 1—*Walt & Marielu Eager*—**Healthy/Sustainable Living—the Why and How in a Nutshell!** 3500 NW Glenridge Pl. 🚗

This field trip will be in two parts, a presentation then a tour. The first part of the presentation will build on the need to eliminate fossil fuel use and its relationship to global climate change. The second part will be a guided tour of the Eagers' sustainable living demonstration home, organic mini-farm, mini-forest, and all-electric-vehicle garage.

Driving directions: From Walnut Drive, go north on NW Glenridge Drive. Stay right on Glenridge Dr. at intersection with Dimple Hill Rd. Begin parking along Glenridge Drive. Plug-in electric vehicles will await your arrival there. These vehicles, driven by their owners, will transport you to and from the site, during which vehicle performance will be demonstrated. Late-comers should park near the site, avoiding mail boxes and driveways.

Those ALL members who make reservations for themselves and their guests will be treated to a complimentary light lunch and social after the tour. This lunch will be created from organic produce, grown by Master Gardeners.

Aug. 8—*Jim Noel*—**Burning Man** First Congregational Church, 4515 SW West Hills Rd.

For the past 20 years Black Rock City, better know as Burning Man, a community of more than 50,000, comes together in the harsh northern Nevada desert for a celebration of art forms, life styles, participatory polity, gifting, engineering, science, fun, and excitement. The city appears, lasts ten days, and disappears without a trace. But oh, what memories.

For six years, in the midst of much more energetic and younger creative souls, Jim and Sue Noel have coordinated a theme camp called "The Elders." They will regale us with stories, pictures and experiences of Burning Man in general, and the joys and sorrows of running a theme camp of thirty elders (mostly 55-75 year young's), throwing a "Brie, Bach and Talk" party every afternoon, and exploring the myriad of other activities—art, mutant vehicles, yoga, interesting life styles, dance, costuming, music, and lots of biking.

After the presentation, they are hosting a "Brie, Bach and Talk" party in their gardens.

Aug. 15—*George Cantwell*—**OSU Summer Term Play: *The Taming of the Shrew*** OSU - Withycombe Hall 🚗

William Shakespeare's plays are imbued with thorny interpretive issues and frequently lend themselves to some dynamic approaches quite relevant to modern audiences, e.g., Ralph Fiennes' recent film, *Coriolanus*. Undoubtedly, the thorniest issue of all for today's theatre is the inexcusable misogyny inherent in *The Taming of the Shrew*. Often billed as a "delightful battle of the sexes," the pathetic nature of Kate's final speech of submission risks undermining the good humored combat that precedes it. What to do with Kate's speech? That is the subject for this discussion with Director George Caldwell.
